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Child Sponsorship

As a retired couple, our first visit to FFHM Baja in 2014 was with a work group from our church in Chicago (Willowcreek). We gave and received so much love during our week-long visit that we returned in a refurbished Airstream trailer for a month-long stay the following December. This allowed us to build a real relationship with a young girl who needed a sponsor. Why did we choose a girl? Because our family included only grandsons who were growing up.

Our first "Sobrina" (sponsor child) soon returned home, but during our December visit, we found another girl crying on Christmas Day, because it was not safe for her to go home for a visit. We soon also sponsored a second girl who was friends with our first sobrina. That became our pattern, as a third young girl also chose us.



Being a sponsor is like being a long-distance foster parent – you love the kids while they are there, but some eventually return home. This is after all, a goal of foster parenting. Of the five kids we've sponsored over six years, three have returned home. For those still at the children's home, we love watching them grow up, and plan to continue as sponsors until they are adults.

Sponsoring one child in a house unofficially makes you family to everyone in that house. They each have sponsors, but see them rarely, so visiting sponsors become great substitutes.

The kids are taught to share everything, so we try to provide mostly-shareable items. On every visit, we ask the houseparent what our sobrinas need. Often that has meant taking several kids out to get shoes, jeans, coats, etc. We always take a houseparent or staff member with us, both for safety and to be sure we buy exactly what is needed.

We have also gone out together for Thrifty ice cream or to the park or to the Conexion Cafe, and sometimes just bring in pizza and/or ice cream for the whole house. Another great outing if you have a 4WD car is to help a houseparent take kids to the nearby beach.

Many of the kids have siblings in different houses,



who also become unofficially yours, as they love to be together doing something fun. One of our favorite memories was having a staff member help us take three of our sobrinas plus their three brothers out for a day at a pool. We also once bought a pair of roller blades requested by one sobrina, who then asked us to bring another larger pair for her older brother on our next visit.



Many of the kids are there due to past abuse. For that reason, one sobrina only wanted to deal with Ellen at first. It was such a joy to see her open up and feel safe with men at the mission over several years. Even if you can only visit once a year, it is amazing to watch the transformation of a sad child into one who smiles easily.

What can you do for your sponsored kids, even when you cannot visit?

1) Learn some Spanish. The Duolingo computer program is a great way for you to learn some Spanish and for the kids to practice their English while you are together.

2) Visit or communicate regularly. We aren't good at writing letters, but before COVID-19 were able to visit in person every couple of months. Even once a year is enough to see how they grow and build a relationship. We have also delivered gifts to kids sponsored by friends who couldn't visit, resulting in still more great relationships with their kids.
3) A cool way to ship items to your sponsor kids is via Amazon.mx, the Mexican branch of Amazon. If



you find something on the U.S. Amazon site, copy the ASIN part#, go to Amazon.mx, and search for the same part#. Often you will find it there as well. Then you can order as normal, using your U.S. login and credit card, and it will be delivered directly to the office at FFHM Baja. (Delivery address is: Av. Vicente Guerrero No 1000 Oeste Vicente Guerrero,BC C.P.. 2290. A.P. 57 MX Mexico.) Be sure to send an email to sponsorship secretary Minerva (sponsorshipffhm@ hotmail.com) and office receptionist Celina (recepcionbaja@gmail.com) so they will know to expect a package addressed to you, and what to do with it on arrival.
