In the spring of 2013, I traveled to Oaxaca, Mexico, on a vision trip for my church. The morning after I arrived, I sat in the dining room with Jill Smith, the Oaxaca Administrator at the time, our mission pastor, and my daughter.

As we began to visit with Jill, I sensed the presence of someone standing behind me. I turned to find a nine-year-old boy with a smile bigger than his face could hold, and arms that quickly wrapped themselves around my neck. His name was Yair, and six years later he still holds my heart.

When I went to Oaxaca, I didn't find an orphanage or a center for underprivileged children; I found a home. This is not a place you visit, take a few pictures for friends to view a week later, and check off a

mission wish list. It's a home with a family (a family that grows the more I return with friends and church members who are also finding arms that wrap around their necks and welcome the kind of relationship that lasts longer than a photograph).

Over the years, I have led many national and international mission trips. As a high school Bible teacher, I lead a trip to Ecuador each spring where my students work with an indigenous Quichua pastor and the 30+ churches he has planted in the mountains of Riobamba and Cajabamba.

## Bible Institute Students Make a Difference in the 10/40 Window - Mountains of Nayarit

According to Luis Busch, the 10/40 Window is a term that identifies a section in the world map with the least evangelized, most unreached people groups in terms of Christian missions. The people in this area have limited knowledge of the gospel, minimal access to Bibles and Christian materials, and extremely restricted opportunities in many areas of their lives (including the opportunity to follow the Christian faith).

Talking about Mexico, we also find a section on the map that has been identified as the 10/40 window of Mexico (el Bajío de Mexico). There are many socioeconomic challenges: great poverty and low quality of life, combined with lack of access to Christian resources and unreached non-Christians.

The Bible Institute had the opportunity to reach out to the native Huichol Indian people in Mexico's Sierra Madre Mountains in Nayarit. These people are unique due to their culture, traditions, and way of life. We were told that, within their cultural practices, just a few weeks before our visit, they sacrificed a mountain lion and as part of a ritual they drank the blood and ate the meat asking their gods for rain. It hadn't rained there for many weeks and they needed to plant corn in order to have food for their families.

## WE THANK GOD FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO REACH OUT TO THREE DIFFERENT GROUPS

1. La Guinea de Guadalupe- in order to reach them we had to walk for three hours up the mountain. It was a great challenge, but it was worth it. Once we reached the top, we were informed that the last Christian group to visit them was three years prior. We found out that the pastor of their local church had



been shot by a man from a rival tribe, and since then the pastor left. The Christians who are left rarely gather for prayer anymore, so you can imagine how excited they were to have someone come to visit, worship and study the Word.

At the same time, we had only brought food for 16 of us and for the number of days we were going to spend there on the mountain. Our surprise was that every day we were feeding a group of about 50. It was amazing to see how the Lord supplied all our needs. We were able to encourage and challenge a small group of Christians to gather every week and study the Word together as a group/church.

2. Huaynamota - It was hard to reach these people. We traveled by land for about six hours in the mountains iust to find out that we did not have access due to poor road conditions caused by rain. We finally reached them by traveling three hours by boat, walking and carrying part of our things with us. To our surprise when we arrived, there was a group of seven Christians there waiting to greet us. Their hunger for the



Word was so great, all they kept asking was to sing, pray, and study the Word together. One day we were so tired that we asked them to let us go to sleep at one in the morning. Early the next day they were there to continue with our studies.

3. Mesa de Las Yeguas – After traveling in the rain, by boat for about an hour and a half, then waking up the hill for an hour, we finally reached out to the people at La Mesa de las Yeguas.

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## **Yair Changed My Life Forever**

As a church member, I lead a trip each summer to Foundation For His Ministry in Oaxaca. I am

passionate about both of these trips because both involve people I love, and both remind me about the importance of taking a relational gospel to the world.

But as much as I love the pastor and his family in Ecuador, nothing

compares to stepping off the plane in Oaxaca and seeing the smile of that "once little boy who's now a teenager:" the one who still lets me hug him like he's my own. It's the same feeling I get when I walk through my front door in Arkansas a week later; it's the feeling of being home.

Never would I have imagined that I would find what I did when I stepped off that plane in Oaxaca all those years before. But that's what love does when you open your heart to the possibility of seeing people with compassion as Jesus did in Matthew 9:36. You don't just get a hug and a smile; you get a child to love forever.

## All God's Children Got Shoes



Do you remember when we received 41,000 new Nike shoes?

In 1998, the FFHM Office and warehouse was located at Osborne Neighborhood Church in Arleta, California.

That year, Lynn Davenport, our Administrative Assistant, was notified about merchandise that was free for the taking. 41,000 tennis shoes!

I prayed, "Oh, that the children in the migrant camps would have shoes!"

The shoes had to be picked up from the San Francisco Bay Area. God always knows what we need before we do, and Jody Blessum from Danville, CA, knew a trucker who was traveling down to LA in a 40-foot EMPTY truck. She said he could pick up the tennies from Vallejo and bring them south to our office.

We had no idea the volume of 41,000 shoes and called for volunteers to help with unloading the truck. Tons of gigantic black plastic bags were ripping at the seams revealing the precious cargo. As they split open, shoes were flying everywhere. The FFHM warehouse was filled to the rafters and there were mountains of shoes in the parking lot.

The pastor of the church was infuriated and said, "These shoes will have to be removed by Saturday morning!"

It took three roundtrips of 675 miles to get all those shoes to the Baja Mission.

And then we realized the greatest of challenges ... the shoes were not paired! Can you imagine 41,000 individual tennis shoes of all colors and sizes that had to be paired up?

Perhaps you were part of the Volunteer Shoe Brigade in Baja in 1998? Every time a pair of shoes was matched, we rang a bell.
